

Teaching Term Position in Psychology

The successful candidate will be responsible for teaching the following courses: Psychology 1001 (Introduction to Psychology), Psychology 2125 (Survey Course in Social Psychology) and Psychology 3125 (Contemporary Issues in Social Psychology). A candidate with a PhD or near completion (ABD) is required. Expertise in Social Psychology is preferred.
